ACT III SCENE IV

New agreement about marriage

“I Think she will be ruled / In all respects by me”
(3.4, 14)

“O’ Thursday let it be” (3.4, 21)

Dramatic irony

“These times of woe afford no time to woo.” (3.4, 7)

“Tonight she is mew’d up to her heaviness.” (3.4,
11)

ACT III SCENE V

Personification:

“Look, love, what envious streaks / Do lace the
severing clouds in yonder east...jocund day / Stands
tiptoe on the misty mountain tops.” (3.5, 7-10)

Foreshadowing:

“O God, I have an ill-divining soul! Methinks I see
thee, now thou art so low, / As one dead in the
bottom of a tomb.” (3.5, 54-55)

Lady Capulet’s Revenge on Romeo (foreshadowing)

“I’ll send to one in Mantua, / Where that same banished
runagate doth live, / Shall give him such as
unaccustomed dram / That he shall soon keep Tybalt
company.” (3.5, 88-91)

Lord Capulet’s Ultimatum

“Graze where you will, you shall not house with me....
I’ll give you to my friend. / An you be not, hang, beg,
starve, die in the streets, / For by my soul, I’ll never
acknowledge thee” (3.5, 190-196).
